S. because of interest in the political climate of Europe and Asia. Randy noted that the end of the "Golden Age" of radio began circa 1947 as broadcast television began making inroads in the American consumer market.

Show and Tell:

We had 2 members bring "show and tell" items. **Jerome** showed a metal-cased Hopalong Cassidy radio. He described it as a desirable item for both Western and antique radio collectors. **Gene** demonstrated the farm radio that he won at the last meeting. He described how he had refinished, repaired, and then configured the radio to operate on 6 volts.
